Planting Calendar

Soul of the Garden



JANUARY

Start planning your warm-season flower garden. Choose flowers you'd like to plant in late March and April, such as zinnias, cosmos, sunflowers, celosia, gomphrena, marigolds, and dahlias.

Look at how much sun you have and decide which flowers will go in beds, pots, or containers. Order seeds early so you have them ready to plant.



JULY

Keep your garden watered and maintained through the heat. Continue cutting flowers for bouquets.

Don't worry if some plants slow down during the hottest part of summer. Keep them watered and they may perk back up when temperatures ease.



FEBRUARY

Get your garden beds and containers ready for warm-season flowers. Start any flowers that need a longer head start indoors.

Clean out old pots, refresh potting soil, and make sure you have seed-starting supplies. Don't worry about starting everything indoors—many warm-season flowers can be planted directly outside.



AUGUST

Begin thinking about your fall and winter flower garden. Look for cool-season flower seeds and plants you'll want to grow later in the year.

Make a list of what worked well this year and what you would change next year.



MARCH

As the weather warms, begin planting warm-season flowers toward the end of the month. Zinnias, cosmos, sunflowers, and marigolds are great choices for beginners.

Start small. Plant a few seeds or a few containers first and see how they do before filling the whole garden.



SEPTEMBER

Continue enjoying your warm-season flowers while preparing for fall planting. Start looking for snapdragons, pansies, violas, calendula, and other cool-season favorites.

Clean up tired plants and make room for your fall garden as temperatures begin to cool.



APRIL

Keep planting warm-season flowers. Add celosia, gomphrena, dahlias, and other heat-loving favorites.

April is a great time to fill empty spots in the garden or add another pot of flowers.



OCTOBER

Enjoy the last of your warm-season flowers and begin preparing garden beds and containers for cool-season flowers.

Save seeds from a few favorite plants if you'd like to try growing them again next year.



MAY

Your warm-season garden should be getting going! Continue planting and enjoy the first blooms.

Water regularly, especially when plants are young. Pick flowers often to encourage many plants to keep blooming.



NOVEMBER

Finish cleaning up warm-season plants and get your pots and garden beds ready for cool-season planting.

Gather your seeds and supplies so you're ready to plant when the weather is right.



JUNE

Enjoy your flowers! Water, remove faded blooms, and pick flowers for the house.

Hot weather can be stressful for plants. Check containers often because they can dry out quickly.



DECEMBER

Plant cool-season flowers such as snapdragons, pansies, violas, calendula, dianthus, and sweet peas.

These flowers can provide color through the cooler months. Plant them in sunny spots and keep them watered while they get established.
